To Whom It May Concern:

On behalf of the Umatilla County Board of Commissioners, I am writing to express our support for a Jubilee Lake accessibility pilot program. Jubilee Lake was built in 1968 in the Blue Mountains within Union County. It is managed by the U.S. Forest Service under the Umatilla National Forest. Families from Umatilla County, other surrounding counties, and visitors from across the nation rely on this site.

In the early 1990s the Forest Service installed approximately a one-mile paved section of the Lake Access Trail to provide equal access for elderly and disabled citizens, capable of supporting a thousand-pound power chair and a quadriplegic user safely. It is also allowed a person using a walker or mobility aid to travel independently without the risk of tripping or falling. No long-term maintenance plan was ever developed, however, and since construction, no significant maintenance has been done. The paved section has now fallen into severe disrepair. Cracks, heaves, and uneven surfaces make it unsafe and unusable for those who once relied on it for stability and mobility

A second and equally serious issue is the annual gate closure. Each year on October 15 the Forest Service closes the main gate that provides access to the lake. After that date, the lake is often snow free and fully usable for weeks, yet elderly and disabled citizens are physically prevented from reaching the paved parking area, the bathrooms at the lake, and the paved section. In the spring, the snow commonly melts long before the gate is reopened, again leaving the lake accessible but blocked to those who rely on mobility equipment. The gate closure, not lake conditions, is what prevents equal access to this public resource.

The purpose of this project is to restore access by keeping the main gate open year-round except when snow physically prevents entry. Also, planned repairs will restore the paved section to safe, reliable condition through in-place recycling and surface rehabilitation. This approach reuses existing materials, minimizes environmental impact, and lowers costs by up to seventy percent compared to conventional asphalt paving. These two changes will again restore access to Jubilee Lake for everyone.

We thank you for considering the project and encourage your full support for this impactful initiative.
