Presentations and activities support all-hazard communication needs and will exercise a Tier II chemical release train derailment scenario. Day one lays groundwork through presentations by renowned subject matter leaders such as the United Kingdom’s [Chris Webb](#), former Head of News and Deputy Director of Media & Communication at London’s Metropolitan Police Service; the United States’ [Bob Jensen](#), former Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Public Affairs for the Department of Homeland Security; and communication leaders of Australia’s non-profit [EMPA](#). Local and national presenters will share their real-world learnings and hands-on experiences from their U.S. case studies.

Day two advances attendees through an integrative tabletop exercise, building upon lessons identified for practitioner success in Managing the Message! Work with the Unified Command, the local, state and federal Policy Team, and community leaders to form and move critical information from ground to strategic horizons.

- Navigate challenges faced when handling an emergency including fatigue, complacency, information gaps, silos, misunderstanding and mistrust
- Understand how effective crisis communication can impact positively on the operational response and how ineffective response can cause loss of confidence and reputational damage
- Support the journey toward a comprehensive and integrated crisis communication plan addressing stakeholder needs
