History of original corner establishment:

The original corner was established by George S. Pershin on October 28, 1880, under GLO contract No. 373, as follows:

Set a pine post and a basalt stone, 14" x 12" x 12", in a mound of stones on a south slope for the corner to sections 19, 20, 29 and 30.

Corner evidence recovered:

Found the original corner stone solidly set on the east edge of a mound of stones. The corner stone is 12" x 11" x 8" and is plainly marked with four notches on the north edge.

Monument and accessories established to perpetuate the original position of this corner:

In place of the original corner stone, I set a 1" x 30" galvanized iron pipe 10" into the ground to bed rock. A 2 1/2" brass cap attached to the top of the pipe is marked as shown in the diagram above. I place the corner stone along the west side of the pipe, with the marks down, and build a mound of stones around the corner stone and pipe, from which:

A 5/8" x 24" iron rod set 23" into the ground with a 3/4" brass washer, marked "PLS 1636 S20", attached at ground level, bears N31° 30'E, 35.6 feet.

A 12" Ponderosa Pine, scribed "T4S R31E S29 BT" on three blazes, bears S25° 30"E, 75.3 feet. A 8" Ponderosa Pine scribed "T4S R31E S30 BT" bears S30°W, 103.8 feet.

A 5/8" x 24" iron rod set 23" into the ground with a 3/4" brass washer, marked "PLS 1636 S19", attached at ground level, bears N29° 30'W, 164.9 feet.

The two bearing trees have a 3/4" brass washer, marked "PLS 1636", nailed flush to the scribed "B", and have a Bearing Object sign nailed above the blazes. The bearing tree to the southwest is scribed on double blazes

I hereby certify the above corner point was perpetuated as hereon described on June 8, 2001. Magnetic declination set in compass: 18° 30°E.
