CERTIFIED RECORD OF LAND CORNER MONUMENTATION

History of original corner establishment:

This corner was originally established by Rufus S. Moore on July 4, 1881 under his GLO contract number 382, as follows:

Set a fir post for 1/4 corner to sections 18 & 19 From which:

A 26" Fir bears N22 E, 97 links (64.02 feet). A 7" Fir bears South, 39 links (25.74 feet). N - 3

In 1993, PLS 1815 set an iron rod in a logging road from which a 23" Douglas-fir, with no signs of blazes, bears South, 25.74 feet and a boulder, $3' \times 4$ 1/2' \times 2 1/3', marked "X" on top, bears N78 E, 19.88 feet.

Description of corner evidence found:

The original 7" Fir is now a sawn Douglas-fir stump, 28" in diameter. I open a previously chopped face an additional 3" and find scribing. Bears South, 25.74 feet. The original 26" fir is gone.

Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner:

At the corner point, as determined from the stump of the original remaining bearing tree, set a 2 1/2" x 30" aluminum pipe 16" into the ground in a mound of stones. A 3 1/4" aluminum cap attached is marked as shown in the diagram above, from which:

A 20" Ponderosa Pine bears N33°W, 2.6 feet scribed "1/4 S18 BT".
A 10" Ponderosa Pine bears S12°45'W, 98.6 feet scribed "1/4 S19 BT".
A 18" Douglas-fir bears S27°30"E, 57.1 feet scribed "1/4 S19 BT".
A 19" Ponderosa Pine bears N60°E, 80.7 feet scribed "1/4 S18 BT". This tree is east of the creek.
An iron rod with a red plastic cap marked "LS 1815" bears S54°30'E, 35.0 feet.
The "X" on the boulder described above bears S71°30'E, 50.4 feet.

The four new bearing trees have a 3/4" brass washer, marked "PLS 1636", nailed flush to the lower blaze and have sign 54-3, Bearing Tree, nailed above the blazes and sign 54-9, Land Survey Monument, nailed to the back.
